Anderson, 22, is about to depart for his third year of racing overseas, this time with new Swedish team sprocketprocycling.com which is based in Wales.

The heady heights of European cycling is a world away from the teenager who sailed his 125 class dinghy around Manly Harbour and collected five Queensland and one Australian gold medal in the process.
